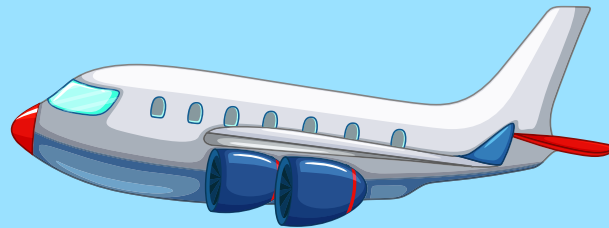
## That's My Job

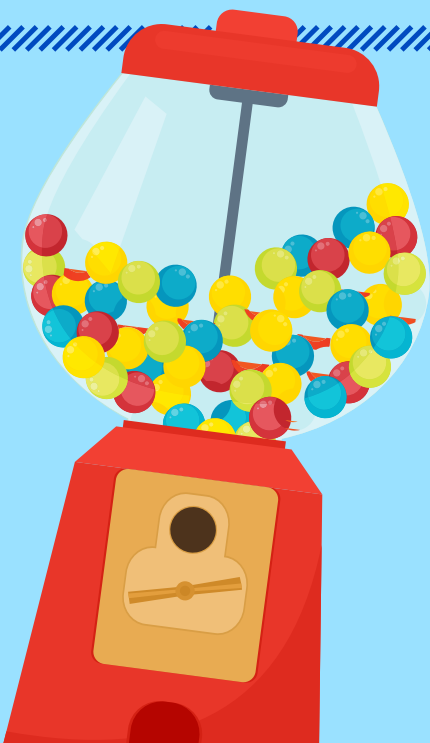

## DON'T PUT THAT IN THE GUMBALL MACHINE!

Have you ever seen a silver-colored penny?

During World War II, copper was needed to make ammunition. So, in 1943, the United States Mint\* made pennies from steel and zinc. These pennies are unusual, but they're not considered rare. However, some 1943 pennies were made from copper by mistake. Those pennies are now really, really rare!

*\*The United States Mint is where our coins are manufactured. There are currently four coin-producing mints in the U.S.: Philadelphia, Denver, San Francisco and West Point. Paper money is made by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing in Fort Worth and Washington, D.C.*
